

## **Independent & Dependent Events**

## What is an Event?

## An event is something that happens.

Examples: it rains tomorrow, you roll a 3 with a die, you wear a blue shirt or if you pick a red marble out of a bag of mixed marbles.

The chance of an event happening can be **certain**, **likely**, **equally likely**, **unlikely** or **impossible**.
